

Pro forma response:

Dear Mr Buchanan,

I understand that you are consulting on guidelines for renewable and low carbon tariffs. While that is a step forward given the confusion for customers currently, I believe that Ofgem should support the development of renewable energy rather than nuclear power or carbon offset schemes. I am worried about climate change and believe we should invest in renewable energy. Renewable energy has huge potential in the UK and can provide clean, secure sources of energy for the future.

On the other hand nuclear power is dependent on imported uranium and produces radioactive waste which must be stored for millennia. Carbon offset schemes are often of dubious value and will do little to help our own energy industry to produce clean energy.

The clarity of the scheme is also crucially important. Customers must be able to understand the variations in tariffs and must not have any doubt that for example 'low carbon' means 'green'. Information schemes should be tested with ordinary energy customers and should enable easy understanding of the tariffs on offer and the differences between them.
