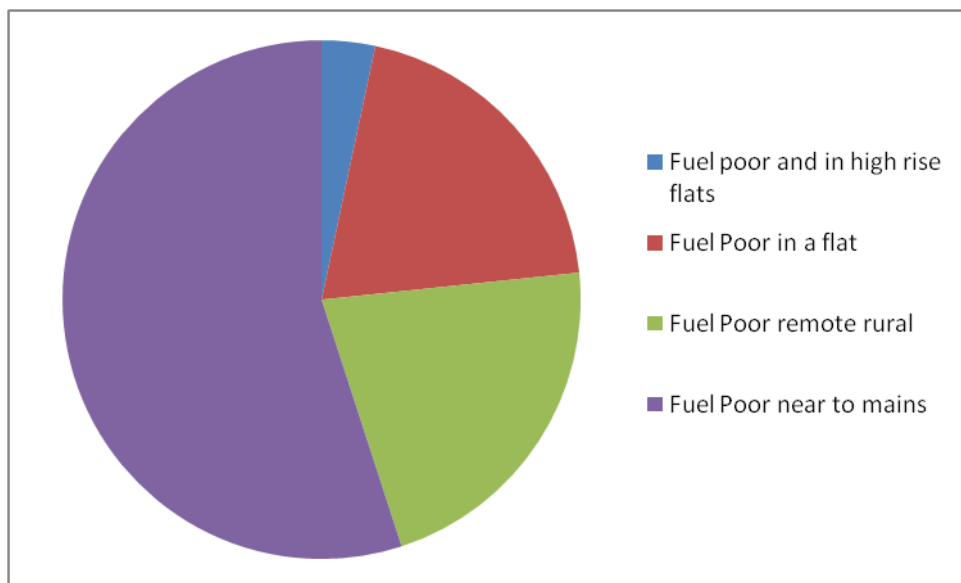

Scope of the Scheme

Non Gas Fuel Poor Property Types

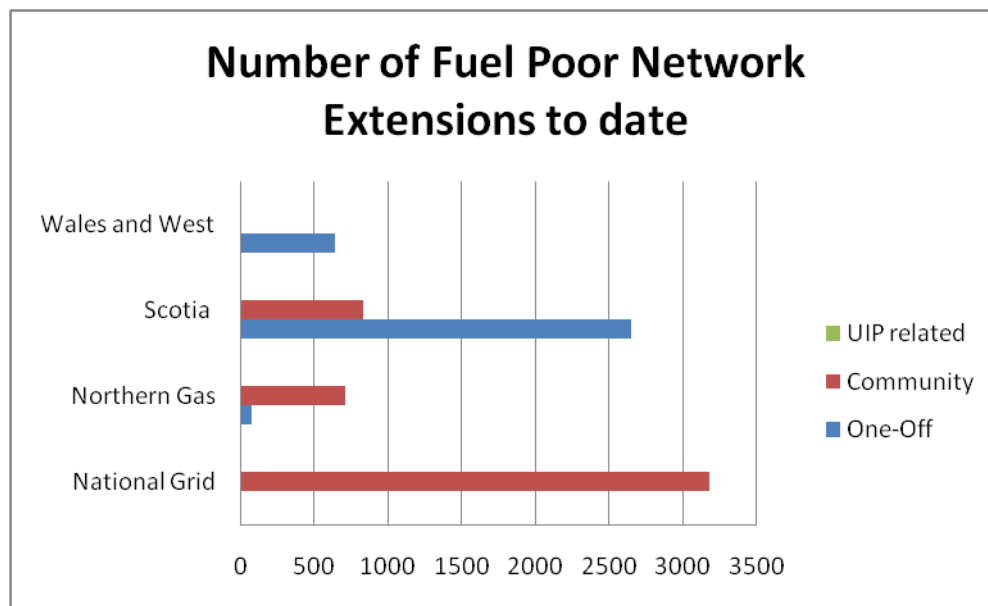


Property Type	(m)
Fuel poor and in high rise flats	0.02
Fuel Poor in a flat	0.12
Fuel Poor remote rural	0.13
Fuel Poor near to mains	0.33

- Approximately 2.7m people are without a gas connection of which it is estimated 0.6m are fuel poor (23%).
- Approximately 40% of off-grid fuel poor more difficult to connect than others
- 0.45m could potentially benefit from alternative affordable fuels.

Success of the current scheme

- Estimated 10 000 non gas households would need to be connected over the 5 year period for the scheme to pay for itself
- More connections have been completed than first expected
- WWU and NGN estimate potentially 3000 connections will be made in the coming year
