Trading Standards Institute response – June 2011

The Trading Standards Institute acknowledges that this is clearly a competition issue based report, but would nevertheless like to make the following comments.

TSI agrees with the issue of clarifying consumer price tariffs in order for them to make an informed choice. When Trading Standards Services deal with energy complaints consumers often complain that they do not understand their tariff and many consumers do not like to change as they have no idea as to whether they will be better off.

TSI would particularly like to draw attention to the issue of misleading doorstep energy sales which cause issues for consumers and could breach both the Consumer Protection from Unfair Trading Regulations 2008 and the Cancellation of Contracts made in a Consumer's Home or Place of Work etc. Regulations 2008.

Surrey Trading Standards recently successfully prosecuted Scottish and Southern Electricity for mis-selling - a problem which is still continuing.

Because of the level of consumer complaints and because the industry has been unable to resolve these issues, the Trading Standards Institute would like to see unsolicited doorstep selling of energy banned.
