



Welcome to your latest quarterly update on the Non-Domestic Renewable Heat Incentive (RHI).

Along with our latest figures on the scheme's performance, this issue has some important upcoming changes to note if you're using biomass fuels.

Accreditations update

Between July and September 2014, we accredited 1,239 full applications and seven preliminary applications - an increase of 93% on the same quarter last year.

This brings our total to 6,061 installations currently accredited onto the scheme since November 2011, when it was launched.

Biomass sustainability criteria

The government plans to introduce sustainability criteria for installations using biomass fuels.

New and existing participants will need to comply. The simplest way to do so is to buy approved fuels from suppliers on the Biomass Suppliers' List.

Glycol in your pipes

To be eligible for Non-Domestic RHI payments, you must ensure you take accurate meter readings. Glycol (often used as antifreeze) in your pipes can affect meter reading accuracy.

If you have glycol in your pipes, make sure your heat meters are suitable and calibrated correctly for the glycol mixture. If you don't, payments could be affected. To find out more on glycol see page 81 of our Guidance Volume 1

Strap-on sensors

We consulted on whether heat meters with strap-on temperature sensors meet the requirements for the Non-Domestic RHI scheme. Following responses, we have decided that based on current evidence, they are not eligible. Affected parties, including participants, can visit the website for more information. **Read more**

Periodic data submission

We will soon be changing what information we ask you to provide as part of your periodic data submissions. You will only be asked to provide meter readings, heat output data will not be required. About the Non-Domestic RHI

The Non-Domestic Renewable Heat Incentive (RHI) is a government environmental scheme that provides financial incentives to increase the uptake of renewable heat.

The Non-Domestic scheme supports industrial, commercial, public sector and not-for-profit organisations by making incentive payments to eligible renewable heat generators and producers of biomethane in Great Britain.

Ofgem administers the scheme on behalf of government and provides quarterly reports as
