Publication of code administrators' performance survey

Today we have published the findings of the first cross-code survey on code administrators' performance. This is an important step in the understanding of the role that the code administrators play in the governance framework of the gas and electricity markets. In particular, in respect of how this role should develop given the expected changes to the market arrangements in the coming years.

The main objectives of the survey¹ are to:

- identify best practice in how the code administrators are carrying out their role; and
- collect research data on the nature of the service, its efficacy and levels of satisfaction, as well as the nature of any particular issues.

This letter sets out the background to the survey and our expectations on next steps.

Background

On 31 March 2016, we published our Code Governance Review (Phase 3) (CGR3) Final Proposals,² including our decision that Ofgem should commission³ an independent third party to undertake a cross-code survey on code administrators' performance.⁴

Following a competitive tender process we commissioned Future Thinking, an independent research agency, to undertake the survey. Future Thinking has now undertaken the survey, during which there were over 200 participants.⁵ We are grateful to those of you who were contacted by Future Thinking, and were willing to share your views by participating in the survey. We have today published the results of the survey on our website.⁶

¹ We would note that both the codes themselves and the code administrators have varying characteristics including in terms of their remit, size and budget. The objective of the survey is not to compare performance across the codes and the code administrators, but to identify best practice.

³ Ofgem would commission the independent third party, and in accordance with the current arrangements under the codes, the code administrators would pay for the survey.

Next steps

Following the publication of the results of the survey, we encourage all interested parties to review the findings and to ensure the areas of best practice are shared and implemented by the code administrators. We note that there are a number of 'quick wins', some of which are already happening. We also encourage the code administrators to consider individually how they may be able to implement recommendations and, where appropriate, to consider how as a group recommendations could be implemented.

We will engage with code administrators on the most appropriate process for undertaking future independent, cross-code surveys.

Finally, we will also be taking into account the recommendations as we implement the CMA's code governance remedies.
