Accreditations update

Between July and Sep 2017, we accredited 396 new full applications. Over the same period we also accredited 1 registered biomethane producer.

This brings our total to 17,520 accredited installations and 82 registered producers of biomethane in Great Britain.

Important changes to the RHI

New regulations came into force on 20 September introducing changes to small, medium and large biomass tariffs.

There will be further changes to the scheme which are a reflection of the government's response to the consultation in December 2016. These will likely come into force next year.

Find out how we tackle fraud

Ofgem has a zero tolerance approach to fraud and will actively investigate suspect behaviour.

Fraud on the RHI scheme can include, but is not limited to, submitting an application shortly before tariff changes come into effect; falsely claiming an installation has been commissioned (including submitting false commissioning evidence), in order to try to take advantage of a higher tariff rate.

If identified, Ofgem will reject your application and report the matter to Action Fraud and the Police to consider prosecution.

Check your fuel provider

The Biomass Suppliers List (BSL) introduced fees in January 2017 for all registered suppliers on the list, and suppliers who have not paid their fees are currently being removed. It is important for you to source fuel from a supplier registered on the list. If your supplier is removed from the list you must find a new one to make sure you remain compliant with scheme rules. Top 5 Tips to get your Periodic Data right

- 1. Make sure your boiler output isn't higher than what's stated on the nameplate.
- 2. Don't forget to keep an accurate record of all the fuel you use.
- 3. Are you measuring the heat losses from your installation appropriately?
- 4. Is your meter installed correctly? If it's measuring your heat use incorrectly this could lead to problems down the line.
- 5. Proper installation, operation and maintenance can make all the difference for your payments on the scheme.

BEIS consultation on changes to the RHI

The Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) is seeking views on proposed changes to the Non-Domestic RHI scheme. This consultation which closes on 31 October 2017, covers proposals relating to; eligible heat uses, very large plants, multiple installations, rules about biomethane plants as well as a range of other cross-cutting scheme issues.
