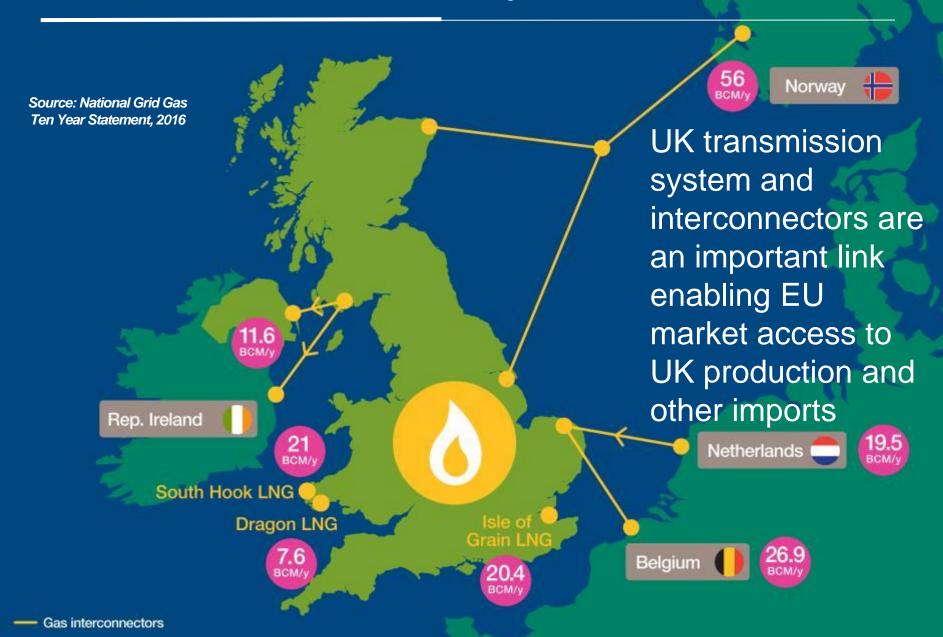

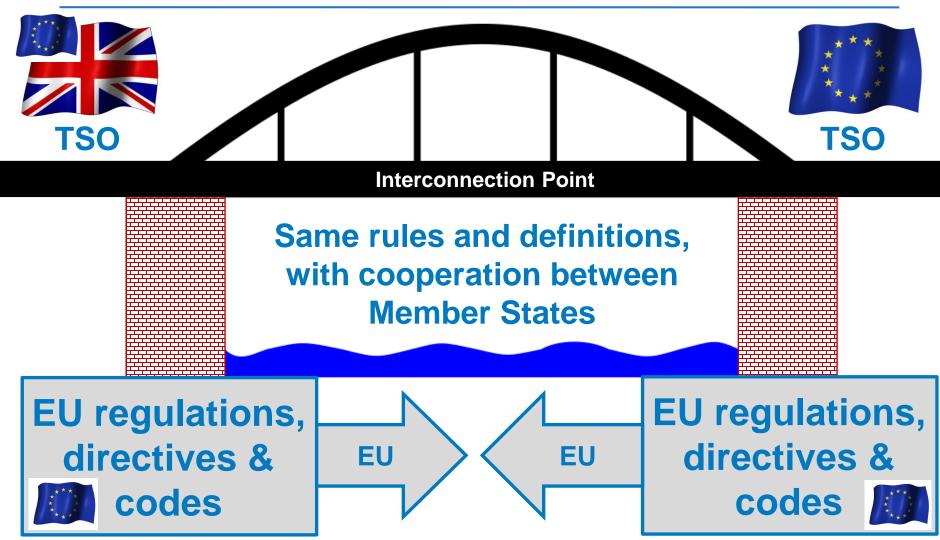
Benefits of mutual cooperation

- Energy plays a key role in underpinning economic and social wellbeing
- Harmonised market arrangements make it easier to trade and enable simpler back-office systems
- Market integration and interconnection enable access to cross border services and assets
- Cooperation on security of supply arrangements
- EC estimated consumer benefit of gas market integration as €50/person/year (Booz & Co, 2013)

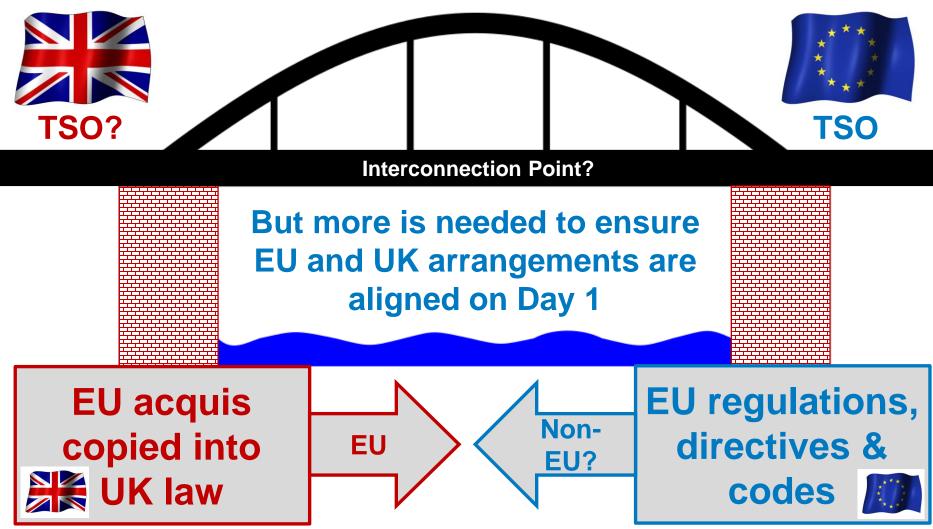
Future arrangements

- Future EU/UK arrangements are subject to negotiations
- But what we don't expect to change is...
 - UK has second largest gas demand in the EU
 - Trading arrangements on the NBP will continue as now
 - UK will remain an attractive destination for gas
- What could be affected...
 - Regulatory and market arrangements for trading across Interconnection Points
